Children who read more have improved vocabularies, better spelling and better writing. Studies show that people with low literacy levels have poorer health, lower incomes and limited work opportunities compare to those with higher literacy skills.

Teacher librarians want to see students acquire critical thinking skills and locate reliable information to help build new learning. Google, copy and paste are not meaningful learning experiences. Teacher librarians want to collaborate with teachers in creating authentic and lasting learning experiences.

As librarians, teacher librarians want to build collections of the best print and digital teaching and learning resources for their unique school community needs, in an attractive, safe environment.

In the national year of reading which is 2012, we should be encouraging our children to participate in and learn to engage and enjoy the school library experience.

Many of us as parents wish that our children experience that lost wonderment of a favourite book, the safe and delicious smell of the books
